The Rotterdam Convention Secretariat has a proposal under consideration to include the Chrysotile form of Asbestos in its ambit. In view of the economic implications of the proposal and large number of employment in this sector of industry the Department of Chemicals and Petrochemicals has entrusted the National Institute of Occupational Health, Ahmedabad which is the Institution under Indian Council of Medical a study on health / environmental Research to undertake hazards resulting from the use of Chrysotile form of Asbestos Based on the results of the study with in the country. reference to the Indian conditions an assessment / decision on continuation of the use of this industry chemical / inclusion of same in PIC ambit can be considered.
  - iii) The total cost of the study comes to Rs.59.66 lakhs out of which the Department of Chemicals and Petrochemicals has to contribute Rs.43.66 lakhs and balance Rs.16 lakhs is being contributed by the industry.

iv) The scope and the methodology of the study to be taken by NIOH were examined in detailed and the course of action finalized in a meeting which was held under the Chairpersonship of Director Chemicals on 16<sup>th</sup> June, 2005. A copy of the minutes is enclosed.

Background:

Consequently in consultation of the scientists of National Institute of occupational Health and the concerned Under Secretary to the Govt, of India, Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilizers it was decided that an environmental cum epidemiological study would be carried out in and around the following industries (organized sectors) in the following sequence:

This is in continuation of letter of even number dated the 19th April, 2005 on the subject mentioned above (a copy of same is enclosed for ready reference).

- 2. Your proposal is under consideration in the Department. While we are awaiting your response to the letter dated 19th April, 2005 we would appreciate if you would provide information on the following points w.r.to your proposal.
  - it is mentioned ther "Fibro concentration in the i) workplace will be evaluated by membrane filter method using phase contrast optical microscopy as per ILO and AIA guidelines. From this it is observed that NIOII would not be measuring fibre concentration in the general environment, namely, around factory sites, public places erc. In this connection your attention is invited to the terms of reference for the proposed study as forwarded vide this office letter No.40018/32-99-Ch.I dated 5th November, 2004. In addition to exposure to the workers within the factory premises, health status of users and general public needs also be assessed. This would help to assess whether the general public is at any slage exposed to any health risk from usage of Chrysotile based products. Also please advice whether the units from SSI scheme of the industry are jucluded in study ambit.

- ii) Epidemiological study: It is mentioned that study will be undertaken in different representative (organized sector) industries of Asbestos Cement Sheets, Asbestos Cement Pipes, Friction Materials and Asbestos textiles. About sample size as earlier intimated the main usage of Chrysotile Asbestos is by AC sheet industry. You are requested to distribute the sample size (800 as proposed) among various segments of the industry depending upon their size. As per reports almost 80% of usage is by aC sheet industry.
- iii) About the statistical analysis you are requested to comment on the variety of usage of statistical model for analysis for the individual sector could be quite low.

We will appropriate your early response.

I am directed to refer to your letter No.NIOH/Hyg/Proj/05/1125 cated 22<sup>nd</sup> June,2005 on the subject mentioned above and to convey the approval of the competent authority to award to your Institute undertake study on heath hazards/environmental hazards resulting from use of Chrysotile variety of Asbestos in the country. The study would be subject to the following conditions:-

- (a) The objective of the study is to conduct an environment-cumopidemiological study to examine the effect on health and environment in the country resulting from use of Chrysotile veriety of Asbestos and is in specific relation to the proposal for inclusion of this variety of asbestos in the ambit of Rotterdam Convention on PIC.
- (b) The scope of the environment study is to examine
  - i) the four segments of the industry i.e. Asbestos cement industry manufacturing asbestos cement sheets; Asbestos cements industry manufacturing asbestos cement pipes; Asbestos industry manufacturing asbestos centaining friction materials, and Asbestos textile industry.
  - ii) people residing in the vicinity of the industry as at (i) above.
  - iii) the unorganized sector/small scale industries.
  - iv) end users,

- (c) The terms of the study will be as follows and as detailed in the proposal dated 22<sup>nd</sup> June, 2005 submitted by NIOH to this Ministry.
  - (i) Methodology:- An environmental as well as epidemiological study will be carried out involving the workers of the representative organization of the aforesaid industries. An assessment of the population residing around these factories will also be undertaken.
  - (ii) Environmental Study:- Fiber concentrations in the workplaces as well as in the vicinity of the factories will be evaluated.
  - (iii) Epidemiological Study.:-
    - (a) Study setting:- This study will be undertaken in different representative industries of the above said sectors. Representative samples of population residing in the vicinity of these industries will be included in this study.

(b) Sample size:- A total of 1500 subjects will be included in this study as the study subjects.

- (c) Study parameters: Every individual subject will be interviewed with a pre-designated questionnaire to collect information in relation to personal, occupational and morbidity details of the workers. Lung function test will be carried out in all subject. All the study subject will be evaluated by radiological examination as per ILO guidelines.
- (iv) Statistical analysis:- Collected data will be analyzed by using Epi Info 6 and SPSS 6.1.4 software.
- 2. The total duration of conducting the study is 4 years. After submitting the draft report, NICH will organize a national workshop to discuss the findings with the relevant industry stakeholders and based on the feedback the final report would be prepared.
- 3. The total cost of the study, inclusive of the manpower involvement, cost towards environmental and medical examination, TA/DA, Contigency and Intellectual fees , would be Rs.59.66 lakhs (Rupees Fifty nine lakh sixty six thousands) only. The payment schedule would be as indicated below:
  - i) 50% at the start of the project.
  - ii) 30% on completion of field visit
  - iii) 20 % after submission of the final report.

- The Government will contribute Rs.43.38 lakhs and The Asbestos Cement Product Manufacturers Association(ACPMA) would contribute Rs.18.00 lakhs towards the total cost of the study.
- 5. The deliverables will include generation of data which would justify the safe standards of its usage as also the reasons/rationale justifying its non-inclusion/ or otherwise in the PIC ambit. The study will also take into account the Supreme Court directives if any.
- You are requested to prepare and send the draft MOU for approval in this regard.
- The sanction for release of the first installment towards the cost of the study is being issued separately.
- You may please go ahead with the study project.

Implementation of Rotterdam Convention on Prior Informed Consent Procedures – Study of Health Hazards / Environment Hazards resulting from use of Chrysotile variety of Asbestos in the country – Minutes of the Review Meeting held on 19.12.2006.

A meeting was held under the Chairpersonship of Ms. Harmeet S. Singh, Director (Chemicals) to discuss various issues relating to the study of health / environment hazards resulting from Chrysotile variety of Asbestos in the country in terms of the provisions of Rotterdam Convention by NIOH. The list of participants is enclosed.

- 2. Welcoming participants the Chairperson briefly explained the developments since the last meeting of the Review Committee. She informed that the final decision on inclusion of Chrysotile Asbestos in PIC ambit will be taken in the Conference of States Parties which will be held in late 2008. For these reasons she stressed on the importance of completion of the study before that. It was advised by her that the study needs to be completed by 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2008 so that it could be examined and submitted in time for due of consideration by PIC Secretariat.
- 3. Dr. Asim Saha who was representing NIOH informed about the progress of the study. It was intimated by him that they have completed their Calcutta study and the same indicates that the asbestos levels are below national / international norms. It was further intimated that while the Factory Act prescribes the norms of one fibre per cc. The industry norms permissible by Ministry of Environment and Forests in operation were .1 fibre per cc. He will be submitting the detailed report with conclusions to the Department within one week. It was also informed by Dr. Saha that

friction material component of the asbestos industry was much larger than originally envisaged. Besides it was informed by him that there were a number of units operating in unorganized sector of textile industry which do not form part of the small scale sector industry also. This is a minuscule segment as 99% consumption of the chrysotile Asbestos in the country is by the asbestos sheets, pipes, friction lining and gasket segments which form part of organized sectors of the industry.

- 4. It was advised by the industry that for the purpose of arriving at a fair conclusion the sampling of normal population (i.e. other than those directly involved in the manufacturing industry should also be included (say about 10%). This was suggested for the reason to have a fair justification for attributing an infliction specially to asbestos exposure of workers.
- 5. After detailed discussions the following decisions were taken
  - NIOH will analyse and submit its report by 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2008 as per the schedule of activities to be undertaken as enclosed. The report will be finalized after due discussions with the asbestos industry.
  - ii) For facilitating early submission of the report NIOH will make an effort to undertake the same preferably at the sites where adequate number of workers, industrial units and people residing in vicinity and localities where people are residing in houses with asbestos sheets.
  - iii) The next field study will be undertaken at Hyderabad.
  - iv) The report finalized by NIOH with reference to the Calcutta study will be submitted to the Department within a week.

- The sampling and medical and surveilence will be with reference to WHO / ILO guidelines.
- vi) The asbestos industry will facilitate timely completion of he study by providing support in the form of manpower / logistics etc. as required.
- The study will cover only the legal bonafide chrysotile usage by industry.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

### Minutes of the Review Meeting held on 14.9. 2006.

A meeting was held on 14<sup>th</sup> September, 2006 under the Chairpersonship of Ms. Harmeet S. Singh, Director (Chemicals) to discuss various issues relating to the study of health / environment hazards resulting form Chrysotile Variety of Asbestos in the country in terms of the provisions of Rotterdam Convention by NIOH. The list of participants is enclosed.

- 2. Welcoming participants the Chairperson briefly explained the developments since the last meeting of the Review Committee. She informed that detailed para-wise comments on the Decision Guidance \ Document on Chrysotile Asbestos have been received from the Asbestos Industry Association. The same were circulated. She stressed on the need for early submission of Preliminary results of the study, which could found the basis of India's stand in the Conference of State Parties, which is scheduled to take place in October, 2006.
- 3. Thereafter she invited Dr. Salyed, Director, NIOH to make a presentation on the progress of the study. The presentation related to the study being undertaken by NIOH in Everest Industries Ltd. at their Kolkata Works. The same involved a sample of 300 workers out of which 288 actually participated
- 4. The presentation covered the objectives of the study methods under use, the hazards faced by the workers, distribution of workers according to the work in the Industry as also the radiological findings.
- a) The preliminary findings indicated the following:

- · There were no complaints related to respiratory system
- About 32% of the workers showed Impaired lung functions.
   The major abnormallty was restrictive type.
- Prevalence of PFT restrictive type of impairment was correlated with duration of work and smoking habit.
- Largest number of cases of restrictive impairment were found in non smokers.
- It was further informed that as a further course of action the NIOH will be undertaking
  - Comparison of chest X-rays and PFT with previous records of the workers.
  - In depth investigation of the suspected cases.
  - · Comparison of abnormalities with controls.
- c) It was also informed that the industry where study has so far taken place, has instituted a number of protective measures to control the work and environmental hazards due to asbestos and other hazardous substances. The work environment survey also indicates that the usage of asbestos fibre levels are below the national and international prescribed norms and that the present environment conditions are not likely to pose any occupational health problem to the workers. It was informed by Dr. Salyed of NIOH that PFT and radiological findings need further investigation for correct interpretation of the preliminary findings.
  - 5. After detailed discussions the following decisions were taken.
  - Details of cause for impaired lung functions of 32% of workers in the location of Everest Industries Ltd. needed to be detailed further for the benefit of the study immediately and report on the same be sent before the forthcoming meeting of the Conference of State Parties.

- i) Further study in the same segment (asbestos sheet) will be undertaken by NIOH at another location preferably at Indore or Hyderabad to give an alternate date for a different climatic zone.
- ii) NIOH will check the usage standards with reference to international norms. The Asbestos Industry Association will provide in tabular form the status of usage prescribed over a period of time.
- The next phase of the study will cover the sheet and textile sectors which will be followed by the Pipe Sector.
- iv) NIOH will provide road map and time lines for submitting preliminary conclusions on the on going study, which could be submitted during the forthcoming Conference of State Parties. This will be submitted by NIOH within 10 days.

She emphasized the need for completion of the study and submission of the final report prior to the CRC meeting which is scheduled to be held from 10th March, 2008. Regarding information sought under RTI Act, NIOH was advised to appropriately handle such cases. It was suggested that while general information relating to the study can be provided, however, piecemeal results of the study will not give real picture and therefore details of the study cannot be shared till the study report is finalized. // She specifically sought to know the action taken by NIOH on the decision taken in the last meeting. In the report of M/s Everest Industries Kolkatta, 32% PFT abnormalities had been reported. NIOH was requested to incorporate scientific justification for the abnormalities and indicate whether abnormalities are due to absorption of asbestos or due to some other factors supported with scientific reasoning.

- 3. It was informed that population at vicinity of Kolkatta site (M/s Everest Industries) was not available for sampling purposes. It was advised by Sh.Ganesan of ICC that any study which was not done extensively and which was not subjected to a proper peer review will not be acceptable at the international level. It was advised that the same has to be undertaken as per WHO protocols. The same was confirmed by Dr.Tiwari, representative of NIOH.
- 4. Thereafter Dr.Tiwari of NIOH made a presentation on the studies undertaken by them at M/s Western India ,Silvassa , who manufacture asbestos cement sheets. This is a ten year old unit\ which has engaged 60 workers. The mean age of the workers was 27 years and mean duration of the job was 4.5 years. It was informed by him that the results of the study indicated that
  - Asbestos fibre level were below the national/international norms. The fibre concentration was 0.0077 to 0.011 fibre/ml.
  - PFT abnormality was observed in 6.8% of the samples. No worker was found to have restrictive type of pulmonary impairments. The abnormality was of obstructive type.
- After detailed discussions, the following decisions were taken.
  - NIOH will make efforts for early conclusion of the study.
     Industry will facilitate the same by providing assistance in the form of manpower / logistics etc. as required.
  - ii) The report will be finalized after due discussions with the asbestos industry, taking into account the WHO protocol including peer review. It will specifically indicate as to how technology has made working conditions better. The same

- will include relevant photographs showing protective measures being undertaken.
- iii) Sh.S.Ganesan of ICC and NIOH representative will redraft/re-word the Kolkatta report keeping in view the international sens/tivities.
- iv) There will be a further follow up to the Kolkatta study for any asbestos linkage to abnormalities.
- Health records of the workers as available with the industry will be made available.
- The next field study will be undertaken at Hyderabad and Chennai and the same will be pre-poned by about two months to facilitate early completion of the study.
- Industry will consider facilitating a study on socio-economic aspects of chrysotile aspestos usage.
- viii) In terms of the information sought under RTI Act, it was decided that while generic information could be provided, the results of the study which was underway could not be shared till the same was finalized.
- ix) The report "Understanding Chrysotile Asbestos: "A New Perspective Based Upon Current Data" By D.M.Bernstein, as provided by the Industry will be made available to NIOH.

  Industry will make available similar relevant reports to NIOH.
- Next review meeting will be held on 13.07.2007 at 1430 hours at the same venue.

Implementation of Rotterdam Convention on Prior Informed Consent Procedures - Study of Health Hazards / Environment Hazards resulting from use of Chrysotile variety of Asbestos in the country - Minutes of the Review Meeting held on 24th July, 2007.

A meeting was held under the Chairpersonship of Ms. Harmeet S. Singh, Director (Chemicals) to discuss various issues relating to the study of health / environment hazards resulting from Chrysotile Variety of Asbestos in the country in terms of the provisions of Rotterdam Convention by NIOH. The list of participants is enclosed.

- Welcoming all the participants, the Chairperson explained the importance and need for timely completion of the study and its importance in relation to the provisions of the Rotterdam Convention on PIC. She invited the representatives of NIOH to inform about the progress of the study.
- 3. Dr. R.R.Tiwari of NIOH explained that they have completed the study at Vapi, Gujarat. A presentation on this study was made. It was informed that this facility is about 15 years old. 70 workers were examined. The medical examination of the workers had been undertaken and the same indicated that the chrysotile asbestos levels are much below the permitted levels. It was informed that 3% abnormality levels had been noticed, the detailed reasoning of which are being investigated.
- 4. Environmental monitoring was also undertaken at different locations viz. fibre feeding, calender machine, cutting/ finishing, near godowns. The fibre level was found to be 0.010 to 0.06 fibre per ml. In pulmonary function test, Koch's infection ( Right upper Zone) were

also. The following conclusions were drawn:-

- Fibre level in all work places were below national and international standards.
- 11.4% workers were having obstructive disorder, 2.9% restrictive abnormality and rests were normal.
- No worker was found to have radiographic features suggestive of interstitial lung fibrosis.
- 5. The Chairperson enquired about the action taken on the issue of PFT abnormality as indicated in the report on M/s Everest Industries, Kolkatta as discussed in the last meeting held on 18.04.2007. It was informed that NIOH will take up the matter.
- It was further informed that NIOH will next undertake the study at Hyderabad and intimated that they are ready in all respects for undertaking the study at M/s Vishakha Industries involving sheets and pipes segments. It was informed that the parameters of the study will be based on usage and risk parameters. NIOH will cover end users also as part of the study. They will also cover the socio-economic dimension aspects in their report.
- 7. It was further informed that the field visits as part of the study will be over by the end September, 2007. Thereafter analysis of data will be undertaken and that will take about a month. Thereafter NIOH will be ready with its draft report. It was decided to hold the next meeting of the Review Committee after Diwali.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

Implementation of Rotterdam Convention on Prior Informed Consent Procedures – Study of Health Hazards / Environment Hazards resulting from use of Chrysotile variety of Asbestos in the country - Minutes of the Review Meeting held on 7<sup>th</sup> November, 2007.

A meeting was held under the Chairmanship of Ms. Harmeet S. Singh, Director (Chemicais) to discuss various issues relating to the study of health / environment hazards resulting from Chrysotile Variety of Asbestos in the country by NIOH. The list of participants is enclosed.

- 2. Welcoming all the participants, the Chairperson Invited the representative of NIOH to briefly explain the results of field visits undertaken by NIOH as part of study. Dr. R.R. Tiwari of NIOH explained that they have completed all the field visits, the latest being at Hyderabad. During field visits they had covered both the community and end users. It was specifically intimated that 404 community subjects near Vishakha Industries had been studied and compared in the recent field study.
- 3. To the specific query from Ms. Harmeet S. Singh, Director that whether the Institute had covered sample size of 1500 subjects as originally planned in the project proposal and in terms of WHO guidelines. Br. Tiwari mentioned that they had not been able to get field sample size of 600 community workers as originally planned but had appropriately covered the factory workers for proper results. The coverage of the balance subjects would also be lioked up by NIOH to ensure that the mandatory number of subjects are covered as per WHO guidelines Presently the Institute was studying the results

collected during the fleid results and this exercise was expected to take about 2 months after which they will be ready to submit the preliminary report which could be finalized after due discussions with various stakeholders. It was informed by the industry associations that they are taking necessary follow up action on the four cases which had been detected by NJOH and are suspected cases of interstitial fibrosis during the study of Everest Industries, Kolkara.

- 4. After detailed discussions, the following decisions were taken.
  - (i) NIOH will check about the need for sample size of 1500 workers with reference to WHO guidelines and ensure compliance.
  - (ii) The interim report will be made ready by NIOH by end | January 2008. NIOH will also organize a peer review of the report.
  - (III) The asbestos industry will facilitate undertaking of study on socio economic impact of Chrysotile usage. The Deptt. of Chemicals and Petrochemicals will facilitate the same, if required.
  - (iv) The asbestos industry will formulate the proposal for organizing a meeting of interested State parties so as to formulate a coordinated stand on the usage of Chrysotile Asbestos in early February. In this meeting important chrysotile asbestos producing and consuming countries will be invited so as to evolve a consensus.
- The next meeting of the Review Committee will be held in end January, 2008. (NIOH has requested that the meeting be held on Monday).

Implementation of the Rotterdam Convention on the Prior Informed Consent Procedures - Study of Health Hazards / Environment Hazardous resulting from use of Chrysotile variety of Asbestos in the country by NIOH - <u>Minutes of the meeting held on 16<sup>th</sup> June</u>, 2005

A meeting was held under the Chairmanship of Director (Chemicals) to examine various issues relating to the study to be taken by NIOH on the above mentioned subject. The list of participants is enclosed. Welcoming all participants, Ms Harmeet S. Singh, Director (Chemicals) informed that a proposal has been received from NIOH for undertaking the study. This study is required in view of the on going developments under the Rotterdam Convention to bring this chemical in the PIC ambit which could impact this segment of the Indian chemical industry engaged in this activity. The study was required to establish the health / environmental hazards resulting from use of Chrysotile variety of asbestos in Indian conditions. It was stressed that a thorough study impacting all the segments of the industry at the work place as also in the vicinity and the unorganized sectors was required so that India could take a stand on scientific hasis in the next meeting of the Conference of State parties under the Rotterdam Convention. NIOH was specifically requested to expedite the conduction of the study.

2. It was explained by the representative of the industry that the organized sector consumed almost 90% of the Chrysotile asbestos in the country. They promised their whole-hearted support to the study. The need for covering the work place as also the vicinity was stressed.

  - (b) People residing in the vicinity of the industry as at (a) above.
  - (c) The unorganized sector / small scale industries
  - (d) End users.
- (ii) The study will commence covering (a) & (b) of (i) above. This will be followed by (c) & (d) above.
- (iii) While initiating the study NIOH will first cover the industry segments as per the following sequences.
  - (A) Rooting sheets and friction material sector-in the first instances.
  - (B) AC Pipes and Textile Sector-in the second instance.
- (iv) The asbestos industry will make available the scientific data relating to effect of usage of Chrysotile of human health and environment as
